

## AFRICAN BOY SEES SNOW FOR FIRST TIME

Rev. Earley King, Pentecostal missionary from Africa, showed films depicting missionary activities in the "Dark Continent" during a meeting held in the local Pentecostal Tabernacle on Monday night. Rev. Mr. King is on a cross-Canada tour accompanied by Louis Antonio, East African boy who arrived in Vancouver as a stowaway last month.

During the showing of the films Louis attempted to explain the pictures in spite of his inadequate English.

Tuesday Rev. Mr. King and Louis motored to Terrace, being taken part way by Rev. J. Linney, local Pentecostal pastor. The party was met by Rev. and

Mrs. Victor Graham of Terrace, who took them to the interior town.

During the trip Louis made his first acquaintance with snow, a substance which he had never contacted before. At the Kwinitsa snowslide he made snowballs and even tasted the white stuff.

Rev. Mr. King and his charge will stop at Smithers, Vanderhoof, Prince George, and will then continue by plane to Dawson Creek. When they arrive on the east coast Louis will return to Africa.

## Prince George May Develop Its Own Hydro Power

PRINCE GEORGE — Mayor Jack Nicholson electrified his colleagues with the possibility that Prince George may next year tackle a hydro-electric project on its own in the basin of the Willow and Bear Rivers. He advocated that the time is at hand for Prince George to take preliminary steps toward having its own hydro development.

Colleagues promptly alluded to the promises made by the B.C. Power Commission to institute a survey of the power potentials in the Prince George district.


