INDIA FOOD SITUATION BANGALORE-Herbert Heover, concluding food investigations in Europe and Asia, warned today that, unless the outside world rushes supplies to the stricken peoples of India, tens of thousands will be in jeopardy of life. He said that it is impossible to hazard a guess as to what the death tells might be, but said that some 23,000,000 are involved in food difficulties throughout India.

VANCOUVER, @- The B.C. Teachers' Federatoin passed a resolution asking an average increase of \$300 in annual salaries and adopted a new minimum salary scale, recommending the latter to be used as a minimum basis in agreements with school boards.

The new scale calls for a \$1.300 minimum in primary schools and an annual wage boost of \$100 until \$2,400 reached. For secondary schools the minimum was set at \$1,600, with an annual wage increase of \$100 until \$3,000 is reached.
