SR. MATRICS TO REGISTER

School Board Decides to Call For Applications With View To Opening Class

Whether or not Prince Rupert will have a senior matriculation class in its High School next term will depend upon a call that is to be made by the board of school trustees for prospective students in such a class. There are already seven possible students but it is thought there may be more, possibly in the district or among ex-servicemen. The school board would like to have at least 10 students in opening up such a class and decided at its meeting last night to advertise for registrants. A fee of \$10 was mentioned. For the past few years there has been no senior matriculation class here and it has been necessary to send students away for the course. The point has been raised by W. W. C. O'Neill, principal of Booth Memorial High School, as to the room for such a class but, as there would be a decreased population this year at the school, it was felt that this could be met. There would also be sufficient spare periods among the teaching staff to handle the Senior Matriculation instruction in the view of Inspector E. E. Hyndman who expressed the opinion that Prince Rupert should "certainly have" a Senior matriculation class. It was a definite hardship on some that there should be lack of such a class. In the course of discussion on the subject, it came out that even Smithers was giving senior matriculation. Trustee Mrs. Earl Becker was inclined to believe that the course should also be given in Prince Rupert if at all possible. Outcome of the discussion was the decision to call for registration of prospective students.
