# POLES TO BE SLAVES

Such Was Intention of Hitler, Nuernberg Trial Hears

NUERNBERG (AP) — Hitherto secret notes of Martin Bormann revealed Saturday that Hitler abandoned plans for the complete extermination of the Polish people in 1940 in order to make the Poles the permanent slaves of the "master race."

Notes submitted to the International War Crimes tribunal by the Russian prosecutor were of the 1940 conference between Hitler and Bormann. Bormann, Hitler's missing deputy who is being tried in absentia, wrote that Hitler had specified that Poland should be treated like a large labor camp.

The trial also heard that at the time of the Munich pact in 1938 Hitler was opposed to war as Germany was not ready.

# ORIENTAL SHIP SUBSIDY ASKED

Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce executive council, at a session Friday afternoon decided to have a brief prepared for submission to the federal government seeking subsidization for steamship sailings from this port to the Orient. This is separate and in addition to representations which are currently under way through the local industrial development committee requesting subsidy for sailings from here to the United Kingdom. A committee consisting of J. T. Harvey, Arthur Brookbank and G. W. Nickerson was appointed to pursue the subject of the Oriental brief and the brief is to be ready for the consideration of the Chamber of Commerce at its regular March meeting.

Friday's executive council meeting heard a report from J. T. Harvey on plans being advanced for a meeting of the Pacific Northwest Trade Association in Prince Rupert in early summer, possibly timed in conjunction with the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at Terrace.
