ITALIANS DRINK PEROXIDE MILK

NEW YORK (P) - A simple method of sterilizing milk by stirring in a small amount of hydrogen peroxide, the familiar antiseptic, is being used in Italy.

The milk is said to taste better than pasteurized milk, an American Chemical Society magazine reports and sterilization is complete for three days. The idea has been studied before, but an Italian chemical company in Milan, Italy, apparently solved the problems of producing hydrogen peroxide that is high enough in purity, stability and concentration to be used in milk.

American investigators are studying the treatment. Containers for the peroxide-treated milk have to be made of tinned iron, aluminum, glass or clay products since the peroxide is reactive to iron, copper, lead and alkalies.


