





In the mediaeval days of Merry England travel was so arduous that even a man with a stout horse could not hope to journey more than thirty miles a day.

With thought for the tired traveller, Henry de Blois decreed that a daily dole of ale and bread be given to every weary traveller who should ask for it at the hospital of St. Cross near Winchester. Thereafter came knights. merchants, wandering musicians and beggars alike to find comfort and warmth and a friendly word in the Great Hall of St. Cross.

Today, some eight hundred years later, two gallons of ale and two loaves of bread are allotted each day for the refreshment of those in need, sufficient to provide sustenance for some thirty
