LESS RAINFALL IN OCTOBER

Weather Was Cooler but More Sunshine Last Month

Touched, perhaps, by a bit of mellow sentiment, the Weatherman bestowed a little more sunshine and a little less rain on Prince Rupert in October than he did during the previous month. He also turned down the burner and let the average temperature for the month drop 10 degrees under that of September.

Hours of bright sunshine during the month totalled 64, one hour more than in September, while the rainfall for the month was 10.63 inches as compared with 13.43 inches in September. Total hours of bright sunshine so far this year are 745, while precipitation for the 10-month period was 75.48 inches.

Comparison with 1945 shows that there were 791 hours of bright sunshine during the first 10 months of last year, while during the same period the rainfall totalled 74.48 inches. Highest temperature last month was 59 degrees on October 14, while the minimum was 32.1 degrees on October 27. Average temperature for the month was 45.1 degrees.

Barometric pressures rose to a high of 30.275 inches on October 14 and reached a low of 29.150 degrees on October 20. Greatest wind velocity was 36 miles an hour from the south-east on October 6.
