



I is a photograph of an ordinary telegraph pole, but on its cross arms are wires forming telegraph circuits which were part of Canada's wartime | and London. defence and security on the Atlantic seaboard. It was one of the best kept secrets in eastern Canada. The pole stands just outside of a small brick building in Moneton, N.B., which houses the delicate instruments for testing the circuits and repeaters of the vital communication system linking up the various naval, air and army bases that are included in the Atlantic Command. This secret testing station was operated and maintained by the Canadian National Telegraphs. The various bases of the Atlantic Command were all linked together by teletype and immediate communication could be had between them and Atlantic Command headquarters in Halifax.
