

## SMITHERS AROUSED BY SNOW TIE-UP —ACTION BEING TAKEN BY GOV'T

SMITHERS—In view of the unprecedented snow-fall throughout the district, trucks and cars have been tied up. The Telkwa Collieries at Telkwa has been closed down and children have been unable to reach school in the Telkwa area because the school bus has not been able to buck the drifts. The Smithers Dis-trict Chamber of Commerce has communicated with the Hon. E. T. Kenney, minister of lands, asking that immediate action be taken to alleviate the situation and the Smithers-Telkwa Haul-ers' Association has sent wires of protest to the minister of public works, the public utilities commission, and their parent organization, the Motor Car-ries Association. They have re-ceived replies that the general foreman over the Telkwa district has been authorized to obtain snow removal equipment where-ever possible to open the roads in that district. At the present time the road between Smithers and Hazelton is closed to all traffic.
