

HOPE FOR SKI CENTRE ON MOUNT HAYS

Out-of-door sports lovers in Prince Rupert may have the chance to obtain a well equipped overnight resort high on the slopes of Mt. Hays at the city's back door, if plans being worked on by the Mt. Blain Ski Club mature. Allan Armstrong, president of the ski club, which has 15 members, told the Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce last night that an opportunity exists to take over Canadian Army cabins on Mt. Hays for use as a hiking and skiing centre.

He saw the opportunity as one for the whole community and suggested that it be supported by

the Prince Rupert Recreational Council.

The Junior Chamber moved to instruct its delegates to the Civic Centre and Rec Council to support the suggestion when it is brought up at the next meeting of the joint body.

The cabins, Mr. Armstrong explained, were a self-contained group used by the army as a look-out post, and there is a good possibility that they may be obtained very reasonably from the Army. He urged a speedy decision by those interested in order to take advantage of a possible immediate opportunity.

The cabins are at an altitude of 1,200 feet and would make an ideal ski or hiking resort. They can accommodate more than 100 trippers overnight, he said.

A small trolley line runs up the mountain to the cabins. "We might be able to use it, but there would be a number of safety factors requiring attention before it could be used for the public," Mr. Armstrong said.

MEMORIAL FOR NOTED MUSICIAN

LONDON, (C)—Britons are being asked to buy a brick each in the proposed People's Concert Hall which is to be a permanent home for the London promenade concerts as well as memorial to the late Sir Henry Wood who founded the "Proms" 51 years ago.

Stressing the urgent need for a new concert hall in London to replace the blitzed Queens Hall, the BBC invites listeners to buy booklets of 10 "brick" tokens, priced at one shilling per brick, and sell them among fellow music lovers.

"It is hoped," said the BBC circular, "that artists, orchestras, choral societies, music clubs and music lovers all over the world will come forward to assist this great cause by arranging concerts for the benefit of the fund."

"Why not form a Henry Wood Music Circle in your city, borough or village with the object of stimulating musical interest and assisting the fund."

"It was one of Sir Henry's dearest wishes to see a People's Concert Hall erected in London."
