The couple sailed later in the evening on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver.

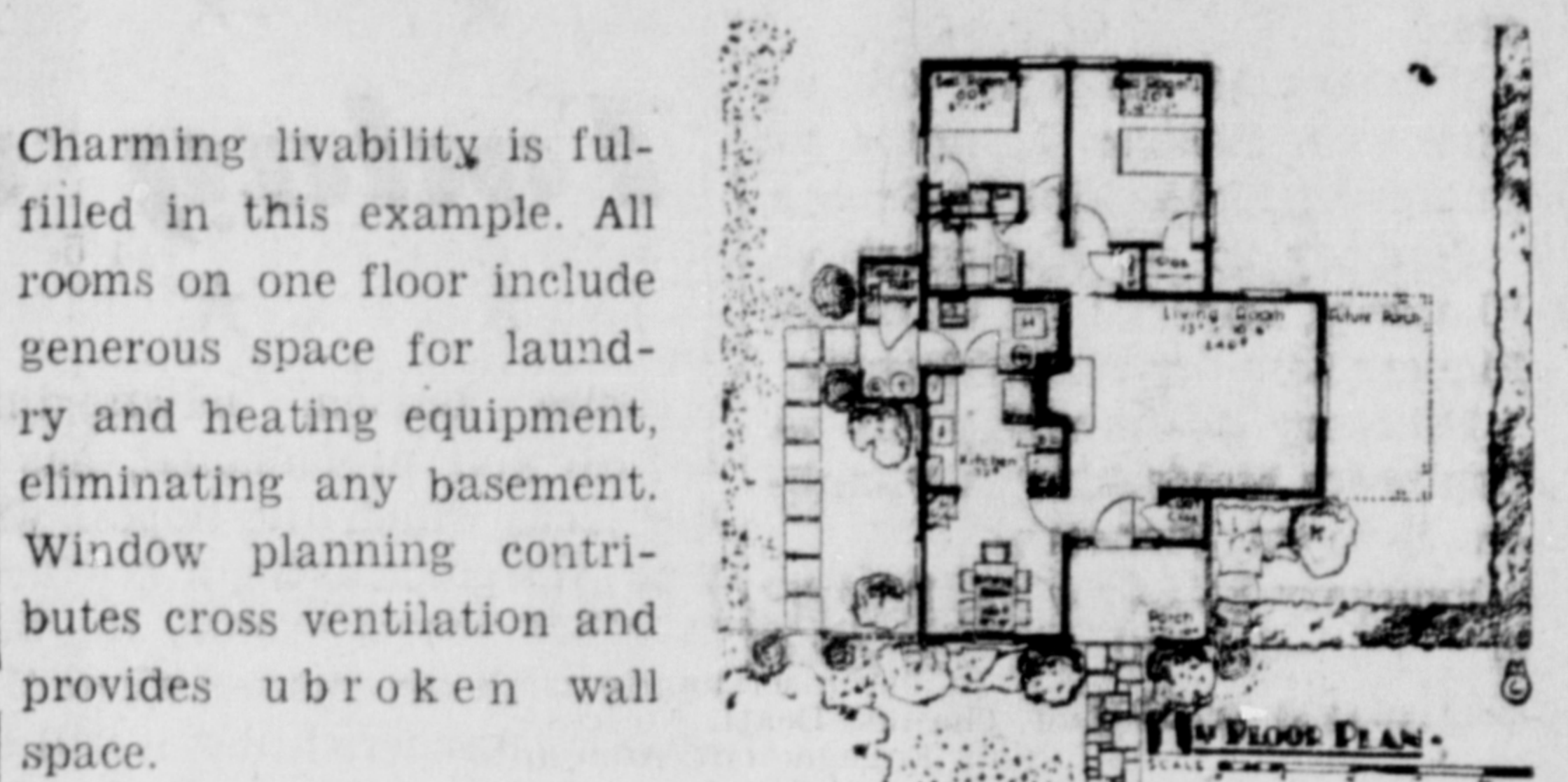
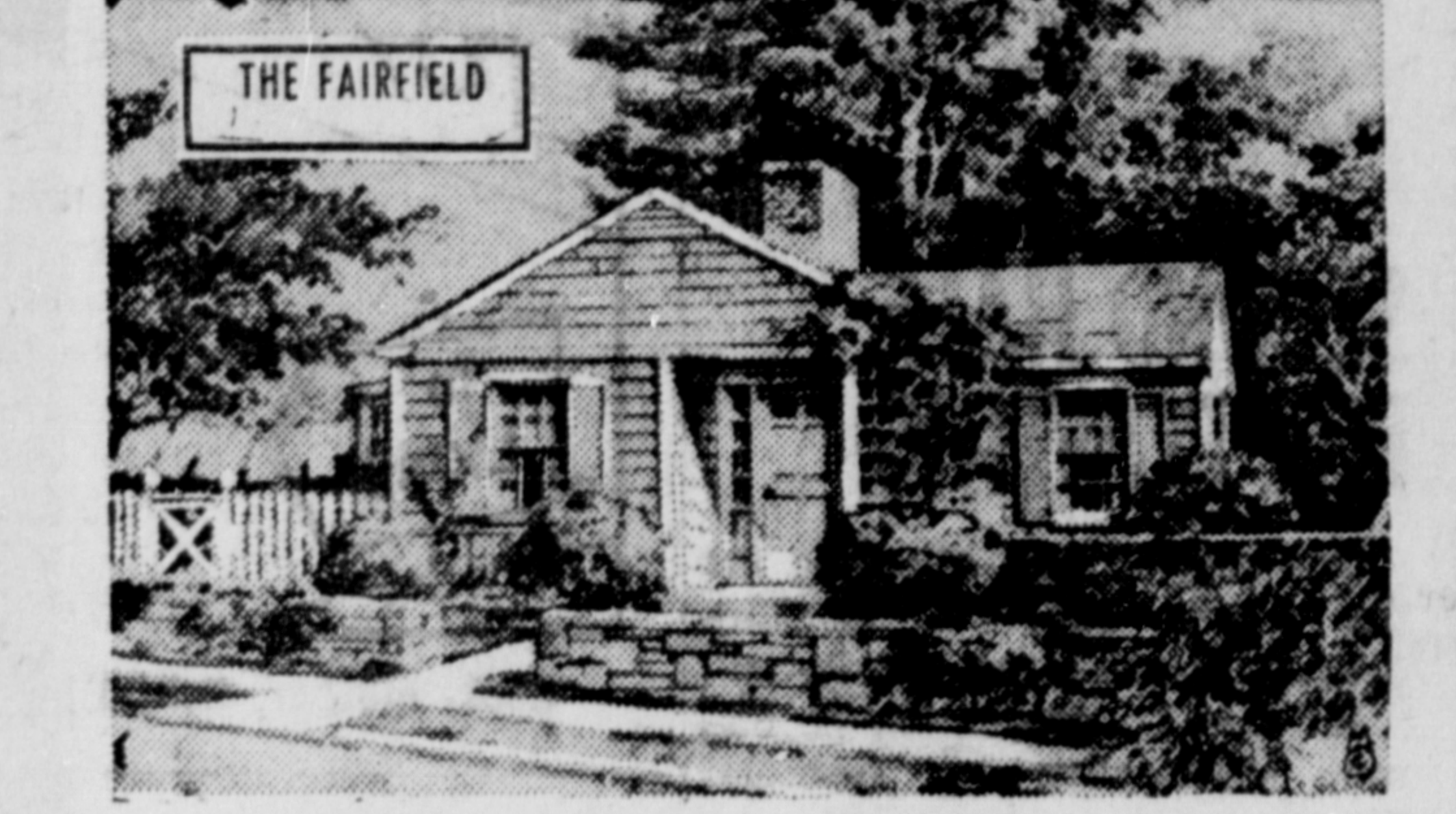
CHELMSFORD, Essex—The British farmer was at his best during the war, James Turner, president of the National Farmers' Union, said in an address here.
