

SPECIAL LOW XMAS FARES

Round Trips on Railways
For Holiday Season

WINNIPEG—Special low railway fares will again be available for the Christmas holiday season, according to R. H. Powers, vice-chairman, Canadian Passenger Association. For Christmas, tickets will be available on December 23, 24 and 25 and will be good to return until midnight December 26, or first available train. The same low fares will apply over New Year's and tickets will be on sale December 30, 31 and January 1, with a return limit of midnight January 2, or first available train.

For those who have a longer vacation, taking in both holidays, the railways will offer a rate of one-way fare and one-half for the round trip, with tickets on sale from December 20, 1946, to January 1, 1947, inclusive, with a return limit of midnight January 7, 1947.

These low fares will apply between all stations in Canada and tickets will be good in all classes of accommodation.



FORMER ASSETS MAN HERE HAS NEW POST NOW

Ian Malcolm Mackinnon, assistant supply manager for War Assets Corporation, former wing commander, Royal Canadian Air Force, and former manager at Prince Rupert, has been appointed acting regional supply manager for the Ontario region, War Assets Corporation. Mr. Mackinnon has been named temporarily to replace D. M. Galloway who is seriously ill.

Mr. Mackinnon has been with the corporation since August, 1945, when he commenced with the consumers goods division and has served at Prince Rupert, Edmonton and Ottawa, moving to the capital city in October last after being appointed assistant supply manager.

Born and educated in Vancouver, Mr. Mackinnon spent 14 years with the Hudson's Bay Company chiefly in the fur trade department in the far north where he was largely concerned with provisioning of supplies, distribution and transportation. As his work required a knowledge of ships and aircraft, he qualified as a commercial pilot and acquired his license in 1930.

At the outbreak of the war Mr. Mackinnon enlisted in the R.C.A.F. as an equipment officer and his work and experiences ranged throughout Canada from the Yukon to Labrador and into Newfoundland. On demobilization in 1945 he joined War Assets Corporation.

lining the up-wind side of the runway, blast at intervals, creating a powerful sound wave. In effect, the sound waves cause the particles of fog to move in circles which vary with the size of the droplets.

As the particles move, they collide, and as they collide, they coalesce and grow. When a particle becomes sufficiently heavy it simply drops to the ground. And the fog dissipates.

Curtains of Water and Air

Other aces up the scientific sleeves include curtains of water and air.

The air, blown upward, comes into play when the wind is blowing fog across a runway from the side. This causes the heat to drift also, reducing the visibility ordinarily achieved. Hence, a curtain of air will be blown straight up on the windward edge of the runway, creating artificially, an eddy which slows down the wind blowing horizontally. Such action serves to maintain the heat over the runway, continuing the clearing where it is needed.

Similarly, the water screen serves the same purpose. It is planned to shoot the water up to a height of 100 feet. Fog particles will coalesce with the water particles, and fall to the earth. Installed on the windward side of the runway, this method will reduce fog particles before they reach the runway, reducing the amount necessary to clear fog over the runway.

Dessicants will also be tried in an effort to determine their efficiency.

War-time FIDO installations, first tried in England to clear paths for returning bombers and fighters, employed gasoline. The costs were high. Use of diesel fuel both decreased cost and increased heat.

Depending upon amount and density of the fog, present fuel costs of clearing an average mile long runway would total from \$15 to \$45 a minute.

The new system is controlled from the operations tower, making a field crew unnecessary. Burners are electrically ignited, beginning to put out heat immediately.

Efficiency of the atomizing burners eliminates smoking, providing clean flames.

What this means to commercial flying may be noted from the fact that cancellations and delays due to fog cost the airlines \$1,700,000 during three months of last winter.

Now, when FIDO barks at Fog to coin a hockneyed phrase—passengers will land in comfort and safety, with fewer detours to emergency fields.
