but increased substantially across the entire west in September, ranging as high as 90 per cent above normal in southern Alberta and eastern Manitoba. Northern Alberta and western Manitoba were up 18 to 25 per cent and increases in Saskatchewan varied from 60 per cent up.

The vital October fall, which stands the best chance of being frozen into the ground, was 35 per cent above average in northern Alberta and 15 per cent up in southeastern Saskatchewan. Small decreases of about five per cent occurred in southern Alberta and western Manitoba. SECRETARY for Port Simpson vestern Saskatchewan and eastern Manitoba.

Apart from southwestern Saskatchewan where a decrease f 15 per cent occurred, all parts f the west reported large inreases in November, ranging rom 30 per cent in Manitoba, outheastern Saskatchewan and orthern Alberta to more than twice normal precipitation in southern Alberta.

No serious deviation in snowfall occurred during December, January or February, with fall ten to 20 per cent below average western Saskatchewan and central Alberta while excesses up to 30 per cent were reported in

other regions. Southeastern and southwestern Saskatchewan were more than 50 per cent below normal in March and continued to show large deficiencies in April. Central Alberta had an average March fall but slumped to onethird of normal in April while a 50 per cent April deficiency after gaining 30 per cent in March. Other regions showed smaller deficiencies with the exception of northern Saskatchewan where slight gains were registered in both months.
