MAY BE HAILED BEFORE UNO AS PEACE MENACE

United States, Britain and France Would Encourage Spanish People to Overthrow Their Dictator

LONDON (CP) - There are reports of antiranco demonstrations throughout Europe.

A hand grenade was thrown into the garden of the Spanish Legation in Copenhagen, Denmark. Demonstrations occurred in Brussels and Sofia calling on the Belgian and Bulgarian governments to take action against Franco.

In Moscow, a Russian radio commentator urged all demo-cratic states to sever all connections with Franco Spain.

It is said in Paris that France Churchi has decided to hail Spain before the United Nations Security Council some time next month on charges of endangering world peace and security.

Frontier dispatches, not officially confirmed, say that Generalissimo Franco has closed the French-Spanish frontier and moved up troop reinforcements along the 300-mile border.
