## SATURDAY SERMON

### THE BIBLE TRUTH

### LETTERBOX

NO LONGER DELUDED  
Editor, Daily News:  
The most hidebound supporters of the outdated and wasteful Liberal government must now have a faint understanding of how entirely unprincipled and unpatriotic the whole outfit is.

The latest hypocritical move of the government in calling for tenders from private shipyards to build a government-owned ship when our government-owned shipyard is standing idle should be most convincing proof to indicate how entirely unprincipledly they are to lead the country out of postwar difficulties.

Like millions of others I was fooled for 24 years by the party name "Liberal" until, from sad experience, I was forced to admit they did not stand for honest and sound government for Canada.

When we consider that the government entered into an agreement with the Americans employing Canadian laborers to reduce their wages to 95c per hour for the same work for which they paid \$1.50 to Americans working beside them and forbade the Americans to sell them anything from the canteens to their Canadian workers, it plainly shows the unfriendly attitude of our government toward their own citizens. While our sons suffered and died on the battlefields of Europe these mischievous men did all they could to reduce our wages and made arrangements with the Americans to discriminate against us.

Seeing those men raise and double their own salaries without anyone being able or willing to prevent it, we might wonder why they should find pleasure in sabotaging the Prince Rupert shipyard. The cause is sinister and deep-rooted. Those men have been in office for a long time. They are used to milking the federal treasury to the limit. They and their political heeblers have invested their earnings in private shipyards, mines and the lumbering industry. They are, apparently, out to choke the activity of government-owned enterprises.

The Election Act should be altered so that people with ambition to enter the political field cannot hold shares in companies competing with government owned enterprises.  
Relief and the breadlines, trademarks of the Liberal ad-

ministration, should soon be in operation again. They were working very satisfactorily to them until another heartless schemer, Hitler, indicated a more direct way to bring suffering to the world. Now Hitler has had his turn and our sons have suffered and died to check him, our government can resume its interrupted policy of introducing misery in a more refined form.  
Of course we are getting what we deserve. We are not compelled to keep the Liberal gang in office. They have not yet got so far as ruling by blood-purges as Hitler first and Stalin now do.  
We can only hope that the day will dawn when the common voter will wake up to his responsibility so these men can devote their entire time to the private enterprises they are now favoring at the expense of us all.

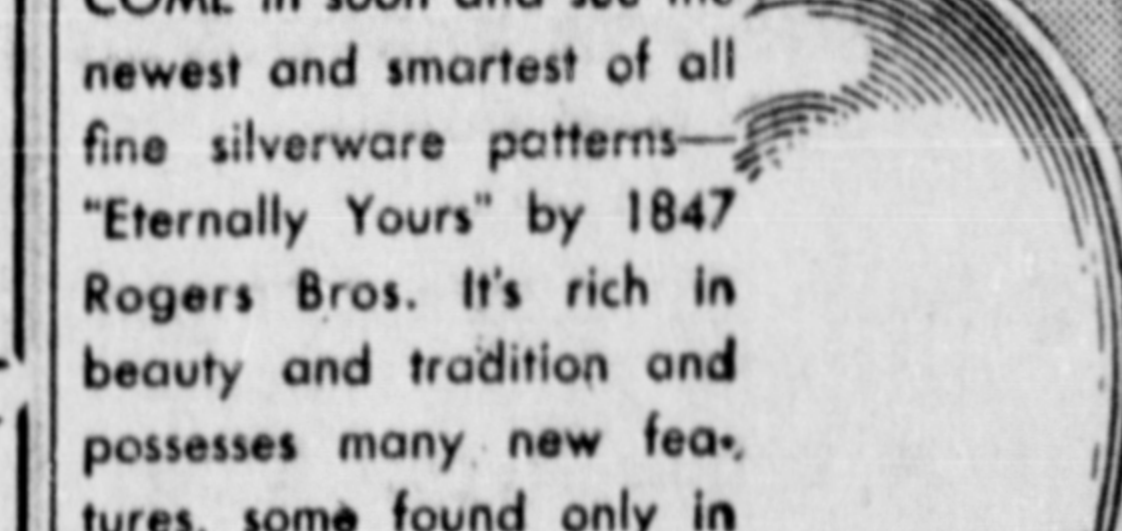
