VANCOUVER (P) - For the first time since July 22, the Vancouver Daily Province, whose International Typographical Union printers have been on strike since June 6, failed to publish yesterday when 20 pressmen, acting on instructions from their local union, refused to handle "hot" plates. The action was taken in defiance of the Pressmen's International Union headquarters which ordered them to stay on the job. An international official is coming here to go into the situation.
