To be Perpetuated as Civilian Association with Useful Objectives
Pacific Coast Militia Rangers whose work during the war was highly commended by the army and air force, is to be perpetuated in a civilian association of the same name, and having objectives similar to its wartime accomplishments.

As a militia organization, the Rangers played an important part in defence work on the coastal region and were particularly active in search and rescue work and as guides and intelligence service to the regular forces.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I save time when making mashed potatoes?

ONE OFFICER, THREE MEN IN U.S. ARMY HERE

The American Army in Prince Rupert lost 20 per cent of its strength last night with the departure of T/5 George Nagy for Seattle where he will receive his discharge. Strength of the property disposal force here is now one officer and three enlisted men.

JEEP GOES OVER SLIDE

Crossing of Kwinitza Highway Obstruction, However, Considered Dangerous
Prince Rupert's automotive barrier to the outside world has been cracked but not yet broken. A vehicle has been driven from Prince Rupert to Terrace, traversing the 1,000 foot snowslide which has lain across the road at Kwinitza since early last winter. Nevertheless, warning is issued that it is dangerous to attempt to drive across the obstruction.

Lieut. Herman G. Lamphere, disposal officer, said this morning that he and his remaining men would probably leave the area by the end of the month.
The U. S. Army property disposal office here also employs 15 civilians, some Canadian and some American.
T/5 Nagy, who sailed last night on the Princess Adelaide, comes from Elizabeth, Pennsylvania.

The vehicle making the crossing was an army jeep which went from Prince Rupert to Terrace and back on Sunday. According to Capt. Edwards, Army Service Corps officer here, the two men in the jeep reported a "terrific" time crossing the slide.
A second vehicle, a private automobile, is reported to have crossed the big slide coming from Terrace but this rash deed could not be confirmed.
