RAINS HOLD UP HARVEST

But It Is Now in Full Swing Again After Delay

WINNIPEG—General rains of the last week-end delayed the harvest for a few days but it is now in full swing again in most areas of the prairie provinces. The rains were of little benefit except to the very late cereal crops and the root and vegetable crops, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

In spite of the rather peculiar crop season, the yield and the grades in the areas where threshing is under way seem to be average.

Sawfly damage in southwestern Saskatchewan now appears to be quite extensive.

Further threshing must be done before an accurate estimate of the damage due to July frost can be obtained. In the Okanagan Valley the weather has been generally hot and dry. A heavy windstorm last week-end caused considerable local damage but the tree fruits board states the damage to the crop as a whole was slight.

TOTEM GOLF IS RESUMED

Popular Event Being Staged Again at Jasper This Year

JASPER—Resumption of the annual Totem Pole Golf Tournament here in the first week of September marks the renewal of what is probably the most popular golf event in the west. After sixteen consecutive years, the event was disturbed owing to the outbreak of war. The last winner was Arthur Johnston, of Winnipeg, who later served for a lengthy period in the Royal Canadian Navy.

So popular had the event become that in 1938 it was necessary to limit the entries to 200 in order that all could get their proper share of golf. The test of the Totem Pole popularity was proven this year when the management received more than 600 applications for the 200 places in the tournament.

Competitors this year will be from all parts of Canada and the United States and will include three former holders of the Totem Pole championship—J. Leslie Bell, of Victoria (1931); J. B. Starky, Edmonton (1933-36); and Don Thompson, of Portland, Oregon (1939-40).

The qualifying round will be played Monday, September 2, and flight will follow until the championship final on Saturday, September 7, over 36 holes. The course is now in excellent condition from tee to green on every hole.
