SYDNEY, Australia — The only woman to have sailed under the British flag as wife of a ship's master in wartime is a Sydney girl, Mrs. Jim Murray Watson, who wears the 1939-45 Star and Atlantic Ribbon for service with convoys. Mrs. Watson left Australia 11 years ago when, as Patricia Long-Innes, she resigned a job as associate to her father, Mr. Justice Long-Innes, then New South Wales' Chief Judge in Equity, to make a pleasure trip to England. Remaining abroad, she joined the Merchant Navy in 1941 and became ship's purser aboard the freighter Lord Cochrane of which her husband, to whom she was married about 12 months previously, was captain. Nearly five of the six years of her married life were spent on one sea voyage after another. She made two trips to Spain, two to the West Indies, two to West Africa, one to Brazil, one to the United States and seven to Canada. She now is back in civilian life in Sydney.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I prevent water from settling to the bottom of the dish when baking a custard?
A. For a baked custard, warm the milk before adding the eggs. For very yellow custard use brown eggs, for a lighter custard, white eggs.

Q. How should linoleum and oilcloth be washed?
A. With lukewarm water, then polished with a soft woolen cloth which has been dipped in milk.

Q. How can I clean painted surfaces that are marred by dirty finger marks?
A. Rub gently with a flannel cloth dipped in paraffin oil. Wipe with a cloth wrung out of hot water.

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
