WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP) - In an historic claim to direct interest in Black Sea affairs, the United States today expressed opposition to Russian demands for a share in military control of the Dardanelles. An American note to Russia was drafted after consultation with Great Britain sent relations between the United States and countries within the Soviet orbit to a postwar low.

The Dardanelles note expressed firm opinion that Turkey should continue to be primarily responsible for defence of the Straits.

Centralization in Canada

OTTAWA (P)-Advocating constitutional revision, Senator G. G. McGeer of Vancouver said yesterday that Canada had been adrift constitutionally by Great Britain and was drifting without anchor toward bureaucracy and centralization.

Senator McGeer charged that bureaucracy was providing bad advice in such matters as inflation and centralization was stalling vital problems such as Dominion-provincial relations. He hoped that revision would bring about the right of Canada to amend her own constitution without reference to British Parliament.
