SATURDAY SERMON

CHRISTIANITY REACTIONARY?

(By Rev. R. A. Wilson, First United Church)

Christianity reactionary? In a changing world as ours it is important to answer this question. In this discussion we shall confine our attention to Christianity as expressed in the "New Testament." It ought to be recognized that Christians are found in various degrees of purity in a multi-
 tude of institutional forms. Here we shall examine the attitude of Christians rather than the preachers and disciples. To define Christianity in a somewhat more fully complete manner we shall use "reactionary" as meaning a return to an earlier condition. On this we can answer the above question with both a "Yes" and a "No."
 Christianity is reactionary. In the past it is the enemy of the world and the flesh and the devil and the Nazis swept into the world. We find that one of the chief barriers against their advance was to be found in the ranks of Christianity. The bishops of the Church of Norway declared in 1940 that "When the government is unwise and unjust and injustice cannot keep silence, we are constrained by a word of Scripture to speak out."
 Jesus responds to each generation with a quotation of His "It is written." In His day the word translated "it is written" meant "it is written and cannot be altered." Legal papers are stamped with a seal as we might write on a document today. A recognized certain seal is proven and binding.
