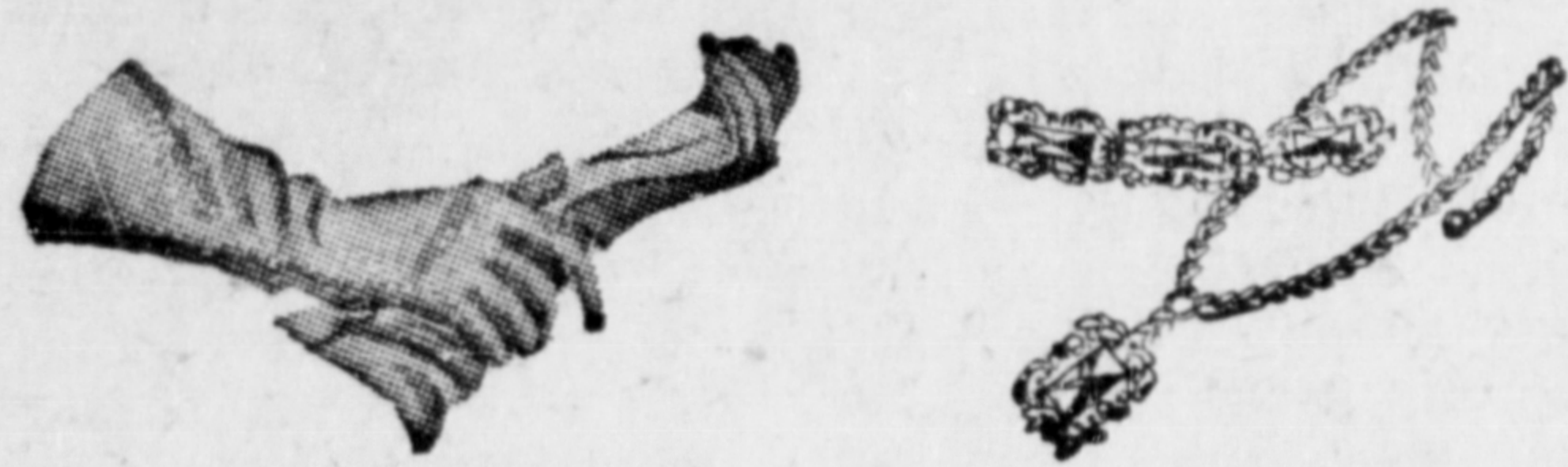

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

May 22, 1946

The Kitsumkalum Basin Petroleum Co. was incorporated at Victoria with capital of \$300,000 and headquarters at Terrace. Head of the company was C. F. Schaub, former Kitwanga-telegraph operator. The company planned to explore "promising" formations in the vicinity of the Beaver and Cedar rivers.

C. W. Applegren, who was riding in a boxcar filled with settlers effects, was killed when a train was derailed near Houston due to a washout. Applegren came from Saskatchewan and planned to settle at Moricetown. There was a rumor current that the New York Central Railway was seeking to take over the Canadian National and Grand Trunk Pacific railways and make Prince Rupert a major port for trade with the Orient.

PR. RUPERT IS HEALTHY CITY

Generally conceded to have one of the most interesting climates of any city in Canada, Prince Rupert may also be considered one of the healthiest centres in the province. The provincial Department of Health Bulletin for April indicates as much in its report on notifiable diseases.

Listing 21 diseases whose occurrence medical practitioners must list with the health department, the bulletin gives the location of occurrence of all but cancer, gonorrhoea and syphilis. Excluding those three diseases, there were 1,811 cases of notifiable disease in the province in April.

Of this 1,811, Prince Rupert had four—all being cases of chicken pox, which was the second most prevalent disease in British Columbia last month with 432 cases.

Most prevalent disease was mumps, of which there were 601 cases, none being reported here. Including cancer, gonorrhoea and syphilis, there were 2,539 cases of notifiable disease. Of these, cancer accounted for 180, gonorrhoea 412 and syphilis 136.
