


When temperature rises a few degrees above the minimum, heat is shut off, and the variation between maximum and minimum temperatures is much less than with the old-fashioned hot-bed. Moveover, the electric heat does not diminish constantly, as does that furnished by manure, and there is no danger of injury to plants from from the army a month ago and belated frost, which may come spent the holidays here with his after the heating power has been exhausted.

The heating cable is usually covered with four to six inches of soil. It is a good idea to place a sheet of fine mesned poultry wire an inch above the cable. with soil between. SCHEDULE Plants grow better in even heat, and current consumption for small hot-beds is low. Thirty feet of cable will heat a hot-bed 3 x 6 feet.


