## Islanders Will Get New Deal

Joint New Guinea-Papua Administration Set Up by Australia

CANBERRA, Australia (C)—After more than three years as a theatre of war, New Guinea and Papua are returning to normal. Both territories are administered by the Australian government, New Guinea as a mandate and Papua under a proclamation.

During the war, they were in use both as Japanese and Allied bases, and were the graves of thousands of Americans, Australians and Japanese killed in the long island campaigns.

Allied and Japanese aerial bombing and shell-fire destroyed many valuable copra and rubber plantations, and some of the other big industries, such as gold-mining, suffered from the effects of war.

Most of the white population was evacuated, but many of their homes, mission stations, business offices were wrecked. Many natives were killed and some of their villages destroyed.

When the war ended, the islands continued under military control until a joint New Guinea-Papua civil administration was set up by the government last October. Its job was to start a rehabilitation program, a big task because of the immense area covered, the scattered population, and the military garrisons left in some areas.

Papua covers an area of about 90,500 square miles and New Guinea has a land area of about 93,000 square miles.

## DURABLE DRUNKARDS

STOCKHOLM, (C)—To test the stamina of chronic drunkards, a football match between them and other convicts was held at a Stockholm jail. The drunkards won 4-3.

There are no reliable figures for the effect of the war upon these estimates but, allowing for natural increases and decreases, they are not believed to have been greatly changed.

Six months after beginning its rehabilitation program, the administration reports that 1,000 whites are back in the area and that the number of Japanese resident in prisoner of war compounds is down to 69,900.

The natives, who went back to their villages after the war to rest and live on the equivalent of war gratuities, now are getting ready to work.

Plentiful native labor is available, but transport to move them from their villages to the job is short.

For the natives, the government proposes a "near deal." The proposals include a 44-hour week, improved rations, an interim minimum pay rate of three dollars monthly, with rations, issues, housing and medical care.

Directors of public health, agriculture, public works and education have been, or will be, appointed, and a school has been set up in Australia to train administrators.
