Still able to win games or save them, Maurice Leyland, hero to Yorkshire and England for 20 years, has decided to quit cricket He bows out, at the end of this county season, with a record that should give him a spot beside the game's great. His county cap worn at a saucy angle, ready smile and irrepressible humor, flashy batting and teasing, left-handed bowling, show that Leyland at 46 hasn't changed much since he went to Yorkshire as a comer in his middle 20's. A glance at his record shows how he came along. In big-time cricket he has scored more than 30,000 runs, including 80 centuries, claime nearly 500 wickets and demonstrated near perfection in fielding and throwing. In 41 test matches he has scored 2,767 runs, including a century in his first test. The England stalwart, whose choice was once automatic, was not included in this year's series, but most players think that only the urge to scale down the average age dictated his ommision. He shares the record for the biggest test stand in England-382 runs against Australia in 1938.


