CHIMES TO BE DEDICATED

The R. L. McIntosh memorial chimes will be dedicated by Rt. 11:15 p.m. Rev. J. B. Gibson, Bishop of Caledonia, at a memorial service in St. Andrew's Cathedral Sunday Princess Louise, p.m. morning. The late Mr. McIntosh was people's warden and diocesan registrar at St. Andrew's from 1906 until his death in 1943. The chimes were donated p.m. by his widow as a memorial to her husband.

The 21 chimes are played by electro-magnetic action over a 14-volt circuit from a keyboard which has been mounted beside the organ console. Two loudspeakers have been mounted in the roof of the church so that the amplified sound can be heard throughout the city.
