

Winston Churchill Counsels Speed-Calls for End of Retribution on Germany

ZURICH, Switzezrland (P)—Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill called today for an "end of retribution" for Germany once she is stripped of power to make war and for a French and German partnership in "some kind of a united states of Europe."

The wartime prime minister's speech made no reference to the foreign policy controversy in the United States cabinet.

Mr. Churchill urged speed in settlement of grave world problems.
