Some Briefs on Social Hygiene

An agreement exists between the Prince Rupert Health Unit and the Provincial police. Women picked up by the police on certain charges are required to receive examination for syphilis and gonorrhoea.

There are at least 6,500,000 persons in the United States infected with syphilis, according to reliable U. S. Public Health service estimates. Gonorrhoea is conceded to be at least twice as prevalent.

All pregnant women need early examinations including blood tests.

An average of 3 percent were positive for syphilis among 425,000 workers tested in 800 miscellaneous industrial establishments in the United States recently.

The British Columbia Board of Health has arranged services to co-operate with private physicians in the province. The entire consultative, diagnostic and medical facilities of the various health units in the province are at the disposal of the doctor. Patients suffering from either syphilis or gonorrhoea and going to their own private doctor are assured that they are receiving the finest medical treatment that is possible.

Laundry Zones Irk Oxford

But British Government Insists Schemes Save Vehicles and Gasoline

OXFORD, Eng., Mar. 13 (P)—Laundry zoning, says Quinton Hogg, M. P., is something everybody can do without. Oxford has had it, and Mr. Hogg has tried it, and he added, it is frightening to hear the Board of Trade suggestion that it will be applied wherever suitable.

When Oxford became an area of zoned laundries—housewives in such areas are required to send their laundry to a government-designated laundry in their own neighborhood rather than have freedom of choice—it also became an area of "lost shirts," said Mr. Hogg.

The people of Oxford accepted the scheme in the noble desire to save motor fuel and rubber but, the member of parliament added, when the government took existing laundries away from their customers they omitted to tell the customers what the new ones would be and when they did tell the people they omitted to arrange for the laundries to call. So, for a long period, no clothes were washed in Oxford except at home.

But Capt. C. Waterhouse, parliamentary secretary of the Board of Trade, said zoning schemes as a whole have saved 34,000 vehicles and the equivalent of 25,000,000 gallons of gasoline a year, so they must be con-

sidered a success once the early troubles of these schemes were overcome.

NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE

IF YOU EMPLOY MALE PERSON
Have they all complied with the Military Call-Up?

Under an Order signed under authority of National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations:

1. Every employer of male employees must examine the documents of employees, and forward advice on their status to the nearest Selective Service Office.
2. This examination must be completed by May 1st, 1944.
3. "EMPLOYER" includes industrial and commercial employers, and also farm operators.
4. "MALE EMPLOYEE" includes all persons working for you, including relatives.
5. A booklet, "EMPLOYERS' GUIDE," has been sent to industrial and commercial employers. A return post card has gone to farm operators.
6. If you employ any male person, and have not been notified of the survey by booklet or card, contact the nearest Employment Selective Service Office and ask for the booklet.
7. Obligation to make the examination rests on each and every employer of male persons. Employers must act.
8. Penalties are provided for failure to comply with this examination, and for male employees who fail to assist by refusal to produce documents.
