**RUSSIANS AT BUG RIVER**  
Army has now reached the Bug River in its over-sweep westward against the Nazis. Twenty enemy divisions in full retreat and have lost 100,000 men in the last week. In the south the Soviet forces are but 25 miles from the border.

**BATTLE OF ITALY**  
yards at Padua and Florence were heavily attacked by Allied planes based in Italy. Fort installations were bombed and the Nazi naval base at Toulon, Mediterranean port. Thirty-six German planes were fighting over Italy and 14 Allied machines were fighting in Italy continues quiet.

### Post-War Proposals Endorsed

Overhauling of Shipbuilding, Steel and Aircraft Industries Advocated

VANCOUVER, March 13 (CP)—A postwar reconstruction and rehabilitation conference on Sunday approved a brief submitted by the Shipyard and General Workers' Federation stressing the necessity of maintaining the shipbuilding industry, developing a complementary steel industry and adapting the aircraft industry to civilian needs.

More than three hundred delegates representing over 150 British Columbia organizations are attending the conference which continues today.

### PITILESS STRUGGLE

Admiral Doenitz Substitutes for Hitler at Memorial Day Ceremonies in Germany.

LONDON, March 13 (CP)—Admiral Doenitz substituted for Chancellor Adolf Hitler at the microphone on Germany's Memorial Day ceremony Sunday, telling the Germans that "a pitiless struggle is being waged for existence or annihilation of the nation."

Hitler had spoken at all previous Heroes' Day ceremonies since the war began.

## PUSH ON IN BURMA

NEW DELHI, March 13 (CP)—A series of Allied successes in the Shan sector of Burma, including the occupation of Butchuk, near the port of Akyab, has been announced by Lord Louis Mountbatten, southeast Asia commander. The British are also pushing beyond Butchuk—the Japanese from their hill positions.

In northern Burma the Chinese and Americans are continuing their southward smash along the main road in the Hukwang valley, threatening to cut the Japanese railway line.

From now on responsibility for the quantity of beer released is the sole responsibility of the provinces.

## Appeal By Pope Pius

ROME, March 13—"How can we believe any one would dare to turn Rome into a battleground?" asked Pope Pius yesterday in speaking on the fifth anniversary as his coronation as Pontiff. Such an act would be "militarily inglorious." It was a "grave-honor" for Rome he declared.

Appealing to the belligerents to turn their thoughts to ways of peace. His Holiness appealed to responsible men on both sides that Rome be spared.

## REDS SMASH ON

# Closing On Black Sea

Kherson and Nikolayev Appear to be Next in Line for Soviet Liberation.

LONDON, March 13. (CP)—Four big Russian armies slashed at the Proskurov-Gusyatyn Railway, leading from the Ukraine into Rumania and Hungary, Sunday, fought to within twenty-two miles of Kherson, important Axis base up the lower Dnieper River, and captured two hundred and ten localities. One Russian force cut the railway at a point presumably about forty-five miles north of the Rumanian frontier. Another Soviet Army is advancing on Nikolayev, at the mouth of the Bug River, and is only 22 miles away.

Odessa is the general objective of the gigantic Russian drive opened up in the south Ukraine. In many places the Russians are advancing at the rate of a mile an hour. The Germans are retreating in disorder, leaving small arms and equipment behind in their efforts to escape.

## SOUTH PACIFIC—WEWAK IS HEAVY HIT

STOCKHOLM, March 13—It has been disclosed that Nazi Propaganda Chief Joseph Goebbels had a narrow escape on February 16 when a block-buster struck an hotel in Berlin where a party was being held. Goebbels got to an air raid shelter in time but other guests, including some high officials, were killed. The room in which the party was being held was hit.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, March 13—American bombers and fighters destroyed twenty-six Japanese planes and probably shot down another six in a heavy assault Saturday on Wewak, Japanese base in northwestern New Guinea, headquarters announced today.

Australian pilots sank two Japanese troop-laden barges near Talasea, New Britain.

Rabaul was also subjected to another heavy bombing but again no Japanese planes came up to resist.

Allied planes dropped 160 tons of bombs on Wewak and 91 tons on Rabaul.
