

ATHENS, Dec. 12 (CP) Sharp gunfire still echoed today through Athens, sending homeless and terrified civilians scurrying out of the path of the fighting while rebel leaders were reported drawing up peace proposals. An impartial source described the rebel leaders as "realizing now that they will eventually lose the bloody conflict with British and regular Greek troops."

Britain today delivered terms to the leftists for the ending of the civil strife. They require that all leftists must end their resistance and hand in their arms after which Sir Harold Alexander, Allied commander-in-chief in the Mediterranean, who is already here, will take steps to bring an end to the present turmoil.

Regulations In Regard to Women Crossing Line Still Unclarified

VANCOUVER, Dec. 12 (P) Canadian women, although able to get Canadian labor exit permits to enter the United States, still will not be permitted under American immigration regulations to enter the United States to work, Thomas L. Hughes, United States consul here, said.

Hughes said that women could enter only under special arrangements through Ottawa or Washington or contingent upon a request by a United States firm for Canadian female labor.

Last week National Selective Service announced that women would be permitted exit without recourse to Ottawa although regulations still require permits for men wishing to cross the border to work.
