On Parade..

1st (R.) Bn. Prince Rupert Regt. (MG)

On Tuesday evening, November 7, the Prince Rupert Regiment will be inspected by Major General Peakes, V.C., C.B., D.S.O., M.C., G.O.C. Pacific Command.

The last occasion on which General Peakes inspected the Regiment was on March 2, 1943, shortly after its formation. The Regiment turned out at full strength and the G.O.C. was impressed with the manner in which the citizens of Prince Rupert had answered the call to the Reserve Army.

In 1943, the war clouds in the Pacific were a good deal darker than they are today and the probability now of the Reserve Army having to defend the shores of Canada is every day becoming remote. Nevertheless, Ot-

tawa still considers that the Reserve Army plays an important part in Empire defence, as a whole, and should therefore receive the support of all citizens capable of bearing arms.

The Reserve Army is one means by which citizens who, on account of medical unfitness, business reasons, age, etc., cannot join the Active Army, can show a solid front behind the war effort and form part of an organized military body available for any type of emergency.

Personnel other than officers, N.C.O.'s and specialists are required to attend 45 parades during the year in order that the level of training may be maintained in a Unit it is necessary that this requirement be enforced from time to time.

Canadian National Railway employees of the Smithers division subscribed 30 per cent of their \$135,000 Seventh Victory Loan objective in the first two days of the drive, and canvassers are still going strong in hope of passing the objective by a wide margin.
