ENEMY OFFENSIVE-Irying lo Break Up

ALGIERS, Feb. 10. (C.P.)-The Germans have launched a strong attempt to break Allied lines on the Anzio beachhead, striking six points along the Anglo-American defence perimeter, while on the main Fifth Army front street fighting continued in Cassino where the enemy are still in control of most of the town.

Fiercest of the Nazi attacks on the beachhead came in the area north and west of Carroceto where heavy fighting continues. Three enemy thrusts directed against America positions west of Cisterna were repulsed and some ground captured.
