ITALIAN BATTLEFRONT

but promised to see me back up
the line. They were a grand lot.
I arrived back at Bari about 5
p.m. but found that all our
chaps had left the Hospitals
there and were further south at
Brindisi and Taranto. Cross-
ing the mountains here, we ran
into blizzards and the snow was
mixed with the fine ashes of
Vesuvius far away and beyond
our sight. It was bitterly cold
and the camp we made was
muddy and miserable.

On Wednesday, March 22, still
raining and wretchedly cold, we
set off early in the morning. We
arrived at Avalino at 12 noon.
Here we met a lot of old friends.
I want you to know that the
rest of the day was spent in
talking to this one and that and
really in having a grand re-
union.

I visited a hospital later in the
day and enjoyed the same un-
stinted welcome and gratitude
for all you people back home are
doing for us here.

Thursday, March 23 we woke
to more rain and snow. We shall
want a lot more than a shipping
company's advertisement to per-
suade us to winter in sunny Italy
once we leave it. We set out for
Casserta which is north of
Naples and having passed
through blizzards among the
mountains, we were thankful to
reach our destination in time
for a hot lunch. Here again the
hospitality of the medical staff
came to the fore and we thank-
ed God for them. Before 6:30
p.m. I had visited all my boys in
twenty-four wards. It was a
wonderful experience but I was
very tired and retired early to
bed in a draughty marquee tent.
The day had been well spent
and I had gathered more happy
memories for my old age. Never
were boys more grateful, more
sincere in their appreciation or
more eager to talk of old times,
old friends and old problems.

Friday, March 24 I had com-
pleted my visitations and I was
much cheered by the boys I had
come to cheer. At 12:30 p.m. I
arrived back in Naples and we
made lunch north of the city,
looking down on the coast road
into the Bay of Naples and at
the violently erupting Vesuvius to
the south.

Naples, like many another
Italian city, bears the scars of
battle. I hardly know which im-
pressed me more—the abject
poverty, squalor and devastation
of the dock yard area or the
beauty of the villas standing in
their orange and lemon groves on
the sunny heights of the Bay
of Naples. The contrast was so
great that the least observant
would notice it.

**PAY VISIT
TO NAPLES**

Vesuvius looked awe-inspiring.
Vast clouds of ashes and dust
shot up out of its crater. The
slopes directly from its edge

were covered with red-hot lava
which poured swiftly down the
slopes and continued at a slower
rate towards the villages.
Saturday, March 25, we spent
best part of the morning meet-
ing old timers at our convales-
cent depot. The boys are going
about in a very dusty condition
owing to the eruption. Indeed
no one could escape. My vehicle
was covered with it and so was
I. But the parcels and socks
and cigarettes bucked them up
and in a short time we forgot all
about Vesuvius.

I ought to conclude by saying
that we left Salerno and headed
north to rejoin my regiment in
the forward area where I am
now and it is here I hope to re-
main with the boys, until again
opportunity permits me to visit
the sick and wounded "some-
where in Italy."
