Prosperity For North

Development Along Permanent Lines of Coast and Interior District Foreseen by Young Judge

Speaking at the weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday, Mr. Justice J. O. Wilson expressed the opinion that the prosperity which war had brought to this part of British Columbia was not a temporary phase but would continue from the development of northern and central British Columbia after the war which had brought about the recognition of its strategic position and potentialities. "We cannot continue to sit around on a veritable Empire like we have here and do nothing about it. If we do not use it, we most certainly will eventually lose it," declared His Lordship.

The judge, who is a pioneer of Prince George, his home having been there since boyhood, spoke of the relation of Prince George and Prince Rupert. They had their differences as communities, he said, but they had much in common. They had had parallel careers with similar hopes and frustrations. "I am convinced today that the great hopes which we have had will soon be fulfilled."

The speaker said he had been greatly impressed with the changes which had taken place in Prince Rupert since he had last visited here a few years ago.

Mr. Justice Wilson rounded out his talk with some amusing actual experiences in the opening of his career as a young judge.

President Frank Skinner was in the chair at the luncheon and there was a good attendance of members with guests in the persons of W. D. Vance, W. L. Armstrong, Bert Johnson (Vancouver), Dugald Campbell (Vancouver), S. J. Jabour (Vancouver) and James Sheratt (Vancouver).

Nurses Are Versatile On Pacific

CANBERRA, June 1 — Australian nurses are following closely on the heels of the Australian troops as they advance in New Guinea. They are staffing a casualty clearing station at Finschhafen and a general hospital at Lae.

At first they lived under campaign conditions, but the Army soon made them much more comfortable. When they went to Lae their mess was a mobile cooker in a tent, but in two days the army built them a mess hall.

Some units have been functioning for four years, in the Middle East and in New Guinea, but the initial enthusiasm has not abated.

In some places nurses and convalescent patients have terraced gardens with rockeries, fountains, and miniature waterfalls. They tried to grow vegetables but found that their were no bees to pollinate. So they did the job themselves with cotton wool wound on twigs. Crops of watermelons, tomatoes and cucumbers were prolific.

Regulation dress in the forward areas is slacks, shirt and heavy boots with gaiters to protect the legs from the scrub mite.

There is a rest home for them in the hills.

Back in Port Moresby the American nurses and Red Cross girls have a beauty salon run by a former New York "beautician," who has all the gadgets, supplies all the treatments up to a machineless wave at £3 and has murals on the walls and curtains on the cubicles.
