Full Employment-The Canadian Goal for the Post-Har Years —

Into what sort of economic picture will Canada's veterans be asked to fit when the war is ended? Will there be jobs? Has Parliament taken any steps looking to increased employment? These are questions to which every service man and woman and their relatives want the answer. The people of Canada have said that the fighting men and women must come home to a better Canada, one in which Canadians must have an opportunity to do a full day's work and to receive a full pay envelope. Many measures have been passed by Parliament, representing the people, to help attain this objective.

RECONSTRUCTION DEPARTMENT

To unify steps taken to provide employment, an Act has been passed, creating a new Depart ment of Reconstruction in Canada. It will be one of the duties of this Department to bring about constructive steps which will mean employment. Since March, 1942, a Parliamentary Committee on Reconstruction has been sitting, hearing evidence of experts as to measures which may be taken to help make Canada prosperous.

TRANSITION PERIOD

Canada has taken steps to provide employment, should there be a slowing down in industry while it is changing from the production of wartime goods to those things needed for the peace. A survey of necessary public works has been made not only by the Dominion, but also by the provinces and the municipalities. These works, not an unemployment program, but needed, constructive projects, will provide

employment in this period.

NATIONAL HOUSING ACT This Act has been passed and makes \$275,000,000 available at low interest rates for the building and repair of houses. It will provide a considerable amount of employment.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT BANK

An industrial development bank is provided for under a new Act of Parliament as a subsidiary of the Bank of Canada. This bank is to extend loans to develop sound business enter-

prises in cases where the necessary financing cannot be arranged with chartered banks. It will have a capital of \$25,000,000. New industries, financed in this way, will add to the national economy.

FISHERIES PRICES

Like the Act putting a floor price under agricultural products, an Act has been passed to stabilize the price of fishery products during the transition from war to peace and \$25,000,000 has been provided for this.

EXPORT CREDITS INSURANCE ACT

This Act provides for a corporation with a

capital of \$5,000,000 and a credit surplus of

\$5,000,000 to permit Canadian exporters to

insure themselves against the risk of loss in

export trade. It also provides assistance to

foreign governments in the purchase of Canadian

produced goods. This is a measure to help keep

handle and dispose of products and a fund of

\$200,000,000 is provided. It will prevent a

slump in agriculture in the immediate post

Canadian export trade at a high level.

AGRICULTURAL PRICES

TO AID BUSINESS

To give full employment, business must be profitable, and several amendments have been made to the Excess Profits Tax Act and the Income War Tax Act to assist business to plan and finance changes in the post-war period.

BANK LOAN

The Bank Act has been amended to reduce the interest rate on loans from 7 per cent to 6 per cent and to provide intermediate and short term credits to farmers.
