Our post-war problem can be solved in only one way-by increasing the productivity of industry. This means world vision, financial daring, constantly improving technology. This means sincere co-operation by management and labour.

There is nothing here beyond our capacity. British Columbia's record proves it.

To the beginner with his pocket-handkerchief Victory Garden. To the farmer who counts his wheat-acres in the hundreds. To the man on the street and to the woman in the home. To Canada . . . and to all Canadians, let us express a heartfelt wish, a hope.

May our pride within our borders, and the respect from other lands that is ours, give us confidence to plan for the future on a scale big enough and grand enough to be worthy of this Canada we love.
