The Experts Say - - -

QUICK FROZEN VEGETABLES.

Many inquiries have come to be made about the best method of cooking quick frozen vegetables. They have suggested the following do's and don'ts on the subject.

Quick frozen vegetables are cooked the same way as fresh vegetables, but for a shorter time. In order to retain as much of the vitamin content as possible, quick frozen vegetables should be cooked while still frozen, with the one exception of corn.

A pan with a tight-fitting cover should be used, and only a small amount of water. This should be boiling briskly before the vegetables are added, and should be brought back to the boil as quickly as possible.

Timely Recipes

TONGUE CASSEOLE

7 cups finely shredded cabbage 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 3 tablespoons mild-flavored fat 3 tablespoons chopped onion 1/4 cup top milk 2 teaspoons horseradish 1/2 teaspoon pepper Sliced, cooked tongue—enough for six servings 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs Cook cabbage in 1/2 inch boiling salted water in a covered saucepan for seven minutes drain. Melt one tablespoon fat in saucepan, add onion (or a little garlic) and saute until golden brown. Add cabbage, milk, horseradish and pepper; toss until well mixed. Line a baking dish with slices of tongue pile cabbage in centre. Melt remaining two tablespoons fat in frying pan, add crumbs and brown, stirring constantly. Sprinkle crumbs on top of cabbage. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degree F, for 30 minutes. Six servings.
