

WEYBURN, Sask., March 6 -More than fourteen young airmen who call India home have just completed four months of training at No. 41 Service Flying Training School of the R.A.F. at Weyburn, Sask., and six months' training in Canada.

All in their late 'teens or early 20's they came to Canada under the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. At least five of them have bachelor of science degrees and one has his bachelor of arts. All speak English fluently and think their Indian education gave them a better idea of what to expect in Canada than a corresponding Canadian education would give of India. But the people of Canada, "a g:eat young country," were

"open, frank and friendly." Probably the most interesting of the group-with his Royal Air Force uniform topped by an air force blue turban and wearing a short black beard-is 19-yearold Rajinder Singh Sandhu of

Pakho Pur, India. A devout Siek, he neither shaves nor cuts his hair. Every two days or so he washes his long hair, then swirls it up with a comb and wraps it under his turban. On one wrist he wears a silver band "to ward off evil spirits," and on the other an air force bracelet. He left Foreman College at Lahore to join the air force when the Japanese

invaded Burma. Venkatesh Reghunath Rajwade, 21, a descendant of the warlike Mahratts likes to tell how western Canadian farmers assisted him recently when he was forced down near Forget, Sask. Who said we were 'Out of it'?

IMPRISONED by the enemy-out of the battle, yet still with a fighting soldier's heart-compelled to wait on the side-lines of the war for the duration-surely such thoughts must be the greatest hardships our prisoners of war have to endure. Broken hearts can hurt worse than broken limbs.
