More Farmers—

SHOULD BE TWICE AS MANY HERE

Somebody Will Use Canadian Land—Who Will It Be?

WINNIPEG, Oct. 24—Western Canada can easily double its farming population and its agriculture production, E. S. Gurton, western superintendent, department of colonization and agriculture, Canadian National Railways, said in a radio address on Monday.

Stating that many responsible economists were inclined to discount the future possibility of increased farm settlement, Mr. Gurton said that, with the inevitable growth in scientific knowledge and improvement in land use, it should even be conservative to plan for a farming population in Canada three times as large as we have at present.

Dealing with present agricultural land of all possible classes and land that has agricultural possibilities in any sense, Mr. Gurton noted that in Manitoba there are presently 32,500,000 acres of such land, of which 17,000,000 acres are now occupied. He said Saskatchewan has 80 million acres of which about three-quarters are now occupied. Alberta 87,500,000 acres with slightly less than half occupied, and British Columbia with 13,250,000 acres, of which 4,000,000 acres or less than one-third are occupied.

He listed acreage under cultivation this year as: Manitoba 6,500,000, Saskatchewan 23,500,000, Alberta 12,000,000, and British Columbia 5,000,000. This gives a total for all western Canada of 42,500,000 acres cultivated or about one-third of all the land occupied.

Mr. Gurton stressed the importance of farming and agriculture in the post-war years. "The land is there," he said. "Eventually, we, or some other people will use it. Perhaps we should be asking ourselves what people they shall be."

Province Buys 7 Million in Victory Bonds

VICTORIA, Oct. 24.—Premier John Hart announced yesterday that the province has purchased \$7,000,000 in Seventh Victory Loan bonds. This brings to \$50,000,000 the total value of Victory Bonds held by the province.

seeks Taku inlet back to the Canadian boundary under aboriginal rights.

The Sitkas claim only the sites of two fish traps on Baranof Island but the Haines and Klukwan band ask for Lynn canal, its tributary waters and adjacent waters north of Berbers bay.

Claims of other bands of Indians were scattered with the Angoon Thlingets asking for numerous fishing sites on Admiralty, Killisnoo, Chichagof and Baranof islands; and the Wrangell Thlingets asking for portions of Prince of Wales, Kosciusko and Warren islands.

The bands ask for lands and waters each direction from shoreline in, varying degrees, Saxman asks waters and submerged lands for a distance of two miles in Revillagigedo channel and one mile from other shores and unpatented lands to a distance of two miles from the waters. The Ketchikan seek control of waters to mid-channel surrounding the lands claimed; the Wrangell division asks for 2500 feet from shore at some points, 1500 feet at others.

A small schooner-type type sealing vessel arrived in port Monday and will go into dry dock for repairs which she sustained when she ran aground in Milbank Sound while travelling north from Seattle. The vessel has been lying in the harbor stream.
