For Salt Lakes**

Local Member Thinks He Will
be Able to Get Results

Before leaving the city Saturday
night on his return to
Victoria after spending a few
days here visiting his constituents,
T. D. Pattullo, M.L.A. for
Prince Rupert, expressed confidence
that he would be able to obtain
action from the department
of public works in the making
of improvements to the bathing
facilities and sidewalks at the
Salt Lake swimming resort. However,
Mr. Pattullo felt that it might be
advisable if some funds could be
raised locally to assist in the work.

At last week's meeting of the
Junior Section of the Prince Rupert
Chamber of Commerce it was
reported that the facilities at the
Salt Lake were in bad shape. The
dam had broken and the water was
dangerously low. Walks, bath
houses and diving tower needed
repairs. Duncan McRae and Sam
Currie were appointed a committee
to go further into the matter.
