Training and Education— Doorways to Opportunity BOTH ARE AVAILABLE AFTER DISCHARGE

In planning Canada's re-establishment program, its makers worked with one principal idea in mind. This was that the only answer to the problem of permanent re-establishment is a job—and that the surest way to get and hold that job is by the skill and ability necessary for it. In Canada's armed services there are many who enlisted so young they have no peacetime skill. There are many who have been away from their peacetime occupation so long they will need brush-up courses. There are others whose outlook has changed in the months and years they have worn the uniform. They, too, will want assistance. Recognizing this, Canada has given wide opportunity for training to all who have served. The test is the desire to help themselves and the ability to benefit.

THE VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

Every ex-service man or woman, who will be assisted in re-establishment by a course in training is eligible for it. To help choose the training most likely to result in security, occupational counsellors will be available while there will be guidance in the services before discharge. Skills learned while in uniform may be found a valuable foundation for a peace-time career.

If being trained in a school or technical institute, fees will be paid, and in addition the ex-service man or woman may receive up to:

\$60 monthly if single; \$80 monthly for a man and his wife.

In addition, there are allowances for children and other dependents.

Many, however, will be trained right on the job, in industry. In these cases, the Government, if necessary, will add to the wages earned while

Training is available for the period of service, to a maximum of one year, but it can be extended

beyond that time if necessary, and if service is more than a year. Disability pensioners get special consideration, their right to training is continuous.

EDUCATIONAL TRAINING

This is available to all who are admitted to university within fifteen months of discharge, although this period of time may be extended under certain exceptional circumstances.

As in the case of vocational training, fees are paid, and there are maintenance allowances up to \$60.00 monthly for a single man or single woman, and \$80.00 monthly for a man and his wife, together with allowances for dependent children.

These allowances will be continued on a month for month basis of the veteran's time in the services, providing no year is failed and providing no supplementals are carried from one year into

In the case of outstanding students, the assistance may be continued to completion of the course, and in exceptional cases, where it is in the national interest, on into post-graduate studies.

POST-GRADUATE STUDIES

Opportunity is available to all who had started post-graduate work, or were about to start it at the time of their enlistment. These studies must

be commenced within one

year of discharge.
