



# Ukraine

Announced by Moscow Today.

MOSCOW, Jan. 12 (9) - In the face of German counter-attacks, the Russians kept up advances today in the western Ukraine and north and south of Sarny where the Red Army is pushing westward. The Red Army has captured Sarny in pre-war Poland, it was officially announced by Moscow radio tonight and Premier Stalin ordered firing of twelve salvos in celebration. After cutting the north and south railroad through the miles north and south of Sarny the Russians were just 75 miles short of being half-way between Kiev and Moscow.

Russian soldiers, in simultaneous attacks with guerrillas, tore through the bewildered land, fording the Sluch River near Sarny Tuesday while Moscow announced fifteen thous and Germans were killed in last week's victory at Kivorograd. After crossing the Sluch the Russians captured Stryelsk, seven miles north of Sarny, and Nenovichi, seven miles south of Sarny, and killed eight hundred
