

The B. C. salmon pack for this year is likely to be slightly less than 1,100,000 cases, Fisheries department officials reveal. The 1943 pack was 1,258,000 cases, while the average yearly pack for the period 1940-43 was 1,696,-500 cases. The herring quota on the 'ower east coast of Vancouver Island, main source of B.C. canned herring, was about 2,500 tons short of fulfillment with a total canned pack of 9,322,246 cases to date, compared with

### TRUE STORIES OF CANADIAN WAR HEROES



### SAVED: ELEVEN LIVES !

Slicing her way through the velvet black of a Pacific night, the hospital ship Centaur headed for Australia with 294 wounded.

She was white, brightly lighted and garlanded with the red cross of mercy.

But at 4:10 on a July morning, the Japs smashed two torpedoes into her and started 16 fires.

Asleep was chief nurse Eleanor Savage of Northern Ontario, and with her was Helen Reid, a South African.

The blast broke Miss Reid's arm and two of Miss Savage's ribs, but the nurses hurried from bed to bed trying to get the wounded on deck.

Quickly the mercy ship listed. Sailors struggled with battered boats. Soldiers, already wounded, dove overboard. Eleanor Savage saw that most of them were diving into puddles

of oil and suffocating before they swam ten strokes. From the other side of the stricken ship flames spurted 30 feet, but beneath those flames was safe water.

While Miss Reid used her one arm to play a hose on blankets brought by a lad of 15, Eleanor Savage wrapped wounded in those wet blankets and persuaded them to leap through the fires to

Although ordered over the side herself, Eleanor Savage stayed, encouraging the wounded until the decks were awash. Miss Reid

jumped before the ship settled but lost her life. Eleanor Savage was the only woman among the 64 rescued and

her citation for bravery said she had saved the lives of 11 men among those 64.
