BOXING CARD WILL CLIMAX YULE HOLIDAY

The fact that the Boiler-makers' Athletic Club has chosen Boxing Day to hold another of its fight exhibitions may be a bit misleading to those people who are not aware of the tradition behind that ancient British institution. Nevertheless, the fight card has a timely place in the holiday period.

On Tuesday evening, two of Prince Rupert's top-flight leather pushers will meet in the main event of what the B.A.C. boys promise will be a well-balanced card. They are Sgt. Bill Porayko, of B.A.C. and Wellman Wallace, of the U.S. Army.

Both these fighters have made spectacular appearances in the local ring, Porayko winning by T.K.O.'s in his last two fights and Wallace taking a decision from Urban Hernandez a while back.

Both boys have trained hard and the fans are likely to see plenty of colorful action. Porayko will fight at 168 pounds and Wallace at 164.

In the semi-windup, Al La Rose, of the Canadian Army, a lad credited with experience in eastern circles, but a newcomer to the ring here, will meet Lloyd Shier of B.A.C. Since both are unknown to the public as fighters, it should prove an interesting bout. La Rose is expected to weigh in at 140 pounds, and Shier at 144.

The card will start off with a gymnastic display and will include two battles royal. Beside the final and semi-windup, there will be seven individual matches. With the exception of Wallace, all contestants including the gymnasts have trained at the Boiler-makers' gymnasium.

The two final bouts will be of four rounds duration, while the earlier ones are scheduled for three rounds.

BURY ST. EDMUNDS, Eng., ☉—Because relaxation of war regulations made his job easier, L. Lack, fire guard officer, asked to have his salary reduced.

LONDON, ☉—Word has reached here of the death at Cannes, France, of Lady Colebrooke, 76, widow of Lord Colebrooke and a sister of Lord Queenborough.

LONDON, ☉—The Church Assembly has unanimously pledged the Church of England to take its share in the Christian reconstruction of liberated Europe.

BRISTOL, ☉—Up to February this year, civilian air raid casualties in Bristol numbered 4,604, including 1,200 killed, it has been announced.

BOSTON, Eng., ☉—A national price record was set in this Lincolnshire town recently when seven acres of farm land sold for \$21,000—or \$3,000 per acre.

LONDON, ☉—Lt. Col. Percy Robert Clifton, C.M.G., D.S.O., 72, who in the last war served as assistant director of railways and fought in Gallipoli and Palestine under Allenby, has died.

WRITTLE, Eng., ☉—Champion rat-catcher of England, a 14-year old Alsatian retriever, has died. The dog's record was 224 rats killed in two hours.

CHRISTMAS FILM AT CAPITOL

Deanna Durbin Picture is Here For Next Monday and Tuesday

By welcome coincidence, Deanna Durbin's latest picture, "Christmas Holiday," comes to the Capitol Theatre here as the interesting feature for Christmas and Boxing Day. Top singing star for many years, Miss Durbin is presented in this as a fine young actress as well. But that does not mean that she does not also do some of her ever-appreciated singing.

The picture, adapted from W. Somerset Maugham's novel of the same title, tells a story within a story and presents Diana in a dual characterization—a worldly cafe entertainer, and a charming bride whose world collapses about her when her husband of six months commits murder.

The film introduces Deanna singing a torch song in a tawdry New Orleans cafe, and reveals her earlier years in flash-backs as she relates the story of her life to a young Army lieutenant. Songs are Irving Berlin's "Always"—which the star sings twice—and an original by Frank Loesser, "Spring Will Be a Little Late This Year." However, these numbers are made outstanding by the fact that Deanna sings them in a torch style never before employed by her.

Gene Kelly, who co-stars with Miss Durbin, gives a fine performance as her husband. Kelly is completely charming and yet thoroughly convincing as a killer moved more by weakness than malice.

Richard Whorf as a newspaper reporter, Dean Harens as the young lieutenant, Gladys George as the cafe proprietress and Gale Sondergaard as Kelly's mother, all come forward with good performances in exacting roles.

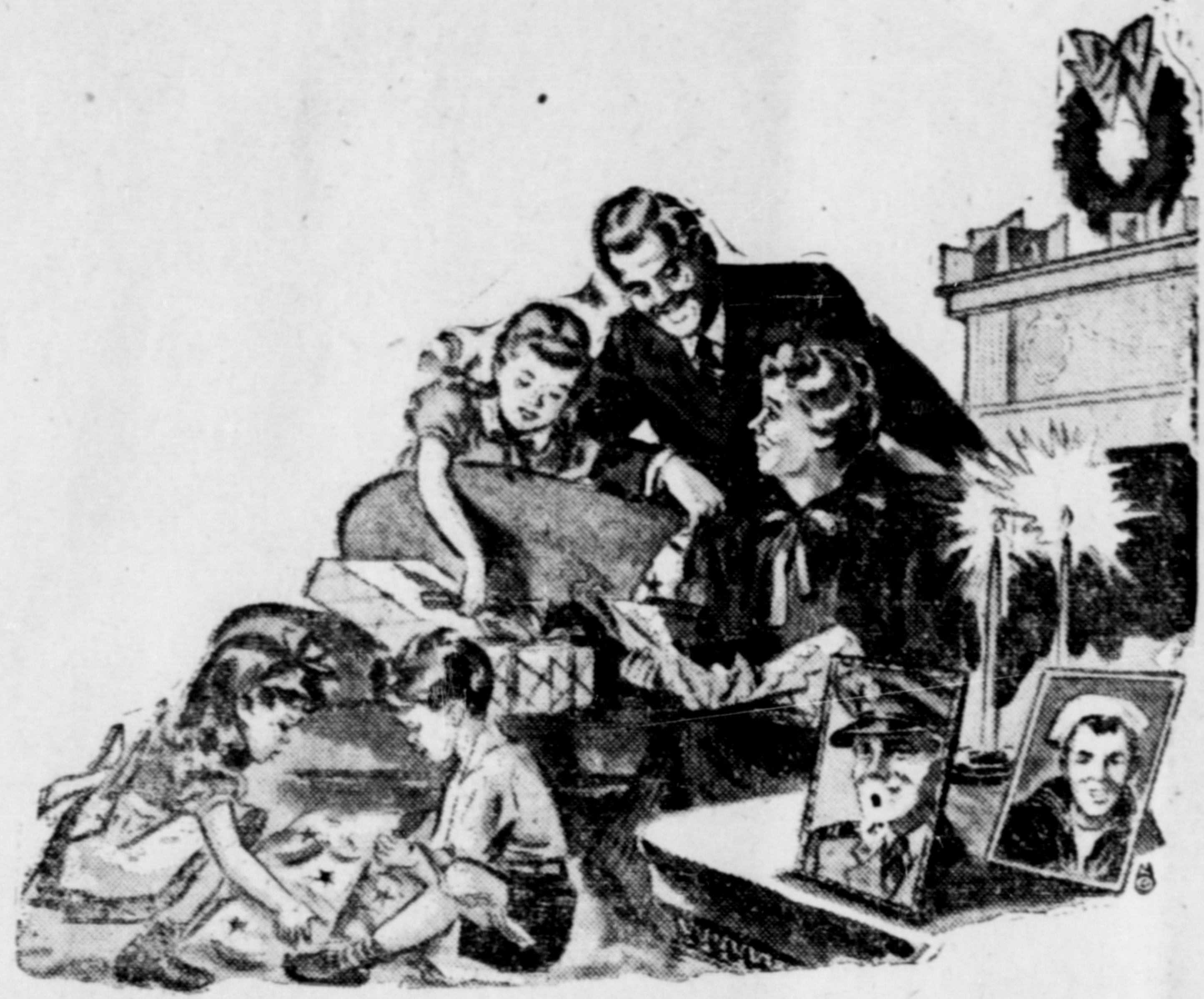
