Metlakatla Pass Opening to Boats On September 1

Metlakatla passage, convenient northwest entrance Prince. Rupert harbor, will be open to small boats during daylight hours after September naval authorities have informed Commander C. M. Cree, nava officer in charge, Prince Rupert area.

The passage has been closed to all traffic since the beginning of the Pacific war. Reopening will mean considerable savings in time and fuel to small boats running north. At present they have to use the travel around Digby Island.

Following is the message issued by Commander Cree:

"Naval authorities advise that on and after September 1, 1944. a gate in the obstruction placed

V.C. HERO MAY RUN IN VANCOUVER AS PARTY CANDIDATE

VANCOUVER, Aug. 29 (P)-The Vancouver Sun in a newspaper story said Col. C. C. Merritt, Dieppe hero and V.C. winner, may be a Progressive-Conservative candidate for the Federal riding of Vancouver Centre.

The riding is now represented by Pension Minister Ian Mackenzie.

The Sun said the nomination was probably contingent upon the war ending before the Federal election took place as Merritt is still a prisoner of war in Germany and the party organizers are unwilling to run a candidate in absentia.
