Trio Entertaining Fighters in Alaska Covered 11,000 Miles in Five Weeks.

WINNIPEG, March 1 (C) — Lonely soldiers and airmen, based at isolated posts in Alaska, won't forget a trio of dancing and singing stars who brought them entertainment from the outside. Ptes. Hank McCune and Buddy Pepper of Hollywood, now with the United States Army in central Canada, and CBC singing star, Patricia Berry of Winnipeg, were the "Alaskan morale builders."

They recently returned from a 11,000-mile jaunt, entertaining American and Canadian forces up north and with them they brought the acclaim of U.S. army authorities. They travelled by air, train and army transport and in five weeks gave 45 performances for soldiers of four United Nations.

They performed anywhere from mess halls to hospital wards, and played to enlisted men, officers, war workers, Eskimos, and even four seals on a rock.

"The seals loved us," said Hank. "They waved and clapped madly."

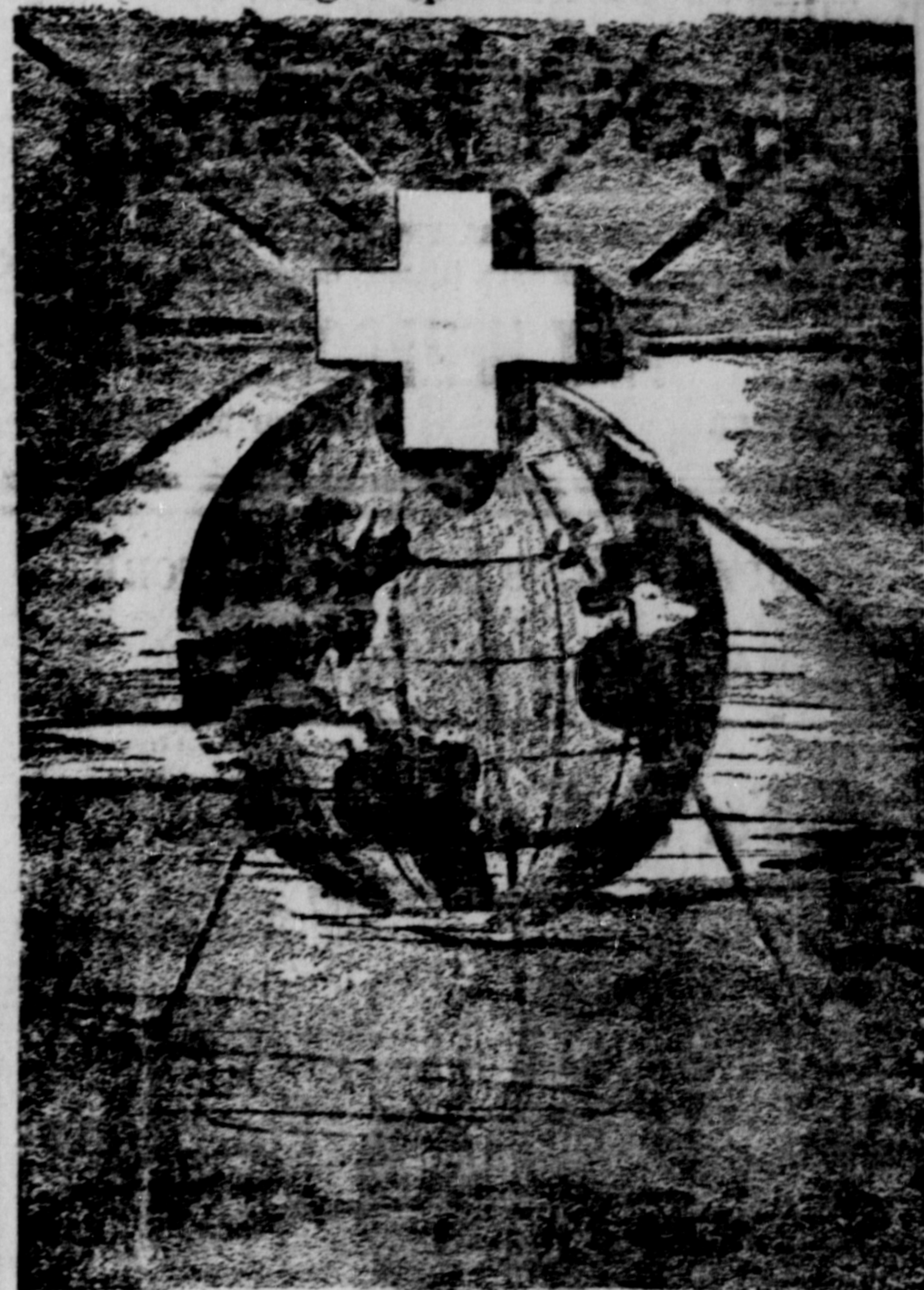
