

Undertakers this by Miss Amy Leigh, assistant morning. The Rev. J. B. Gibson, superintendent of welfare, for a dean of St. Andrew's Anglican talk to a representative meeting of twenty-two women's organizations yesterday afternoon.

Miss Leigh is spending a few days in Prince Rupert on official business and expressed her appreciation of the opportunity to discuss community problems with forward-thinking citizens here. Previously reported missing on Miss Leigh has visited all urban and rural centres in the province and she was delighted to find that already in Prince Rupert the citizens were undertaking a community survey and that a coordinating committe had been set up to select sub-committees for various areas of interest.

With reference to co-ordina-

tion, she said that this was a day of co-operative planning on local, provincial, national, and international levels. To illustrate her point she used the example of the existing co-operation and | co-ordination of the Armed services at home and abroad. A further illustration was the co-ordinating council of war services which Vancouver formed in the first months of war in order to assure a united home front. Here, as elsewhere, communities were confronted with multiple problems attributable in large measure to the war. Community and family break-downs were preventable insofar as the community became aware of the causes and put forth a planned effort to combat these.

Miss Leigh explained that each member of the community and each organization had its own particular part to play but, like a car, the parts were of little use unless properly assembled. She wained the women's organiza tions that they must not los sight of the various men's organ izations, service clubs, etc., which were also doing excellent work in the community. The essential thing was to combine forces. She hoped that as a result of the survey Prince Rupert would set an example in community planning by taking some decisive action to solve the problems revealed thereby.

Because of the delinquency rate, the Vancouver Council of Social Agencies conducted a survey of existing facilities. As a result neighborhood houses are established and are now providing a meeting place for groups

In the discussion that followed was made to Community Chests vs. Tag Days. A point made was that a community should not undertake changes of this nature without careful consideration. It was felt that a Council of Social Agencies as it existed in larger cities might not be feasible at this time for Prince Rupert whereas a citizen's committee or co-ordinating council would be practicable and advantageous.

Mrs. J. J. Gillis, President the Catholic Women's League. moved a vote of thanks to the speaker. This was seconded by Mrs. A. L. Haines, representing the Prince Rupert Parent Teach. ers' Association.
