Cambrai Chapter Backs Nutrition Week

Full community support for its forthcoming Nutrition Week is being sought by Cambrai Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, and by the Union Board of Health Nutrition Committee, Mrs. Jens Munthe, regent of the chapter, and a member of the committee, said today. The committee plans to make Nutrition Week, to be observed October 2 to 7 a time not only to acquaint the general public with the facts concerning better nutrition but to enlist full support in Prince Rupert of the Board of Health Nutrition committee's program.

"We realize that food is all important to health," Mrs. Munthe stated. "Faulty nutrition is apparently all too common, even here in Prince Rupert, where it affects 90 percent of the people, according to a recent survey in school children," she continued. "In recent years the newer knowledge of nutrition has given us the weapons to prevent the effects of bad food habits. This knowledge is now available to all and I believe it only needs to be put into practice. We are looking particularly for the co-operation of women's groups and I am proud that Cambrai Chapter has been given this opportunity for a valuable community service to the women of Prince Rupert."

Renovated, redecorated and refurbished throughout, the Knights of Columbus Canadian Army Hut on Fulton Street presents a scene of complete and delightful transformation. In addition to the re-flooring and the repainting, the renewal work includes lighting fixtures and drapes and a large quantity of fine new furniture has also been added. In addition to furniture which has already arrived more is due.

By the time of the reopening tomorrow night all the old recreational features will be back in place with many new ones.

Charlie Balagno and his enthusiastic junior hostess assistants as well as a few servicemen volunteers are showing signs of weariness after a solid month of hard work day and night during the past month but they will be rewarded with the satisfaction of a good job well done and, no doubt, they will be duly applauded when the place is thrown open again tomorrow night. The dance band of H.M.C.S. Chatham will provide music for the reopening dance.


