Deep In Lithuania

Nazis Appear Preparing to Abandon Baltic States

LONDON, July 11 (CP)-Russians, streaming deep into Lithuania, thrust within striking distance Tuesday of the East Prussian frontier and moved swiftly toward the Baltic coast in wide enveloping advances which threatened to trap two German armies in the north.

The British press said yesterday that the Russians had advanced to within sixty miles of East Prussia and there were indications that the Nazis might be preparing to abandon the Baltic States.
