Prizes For Suggestions

The local committee of an
allied force today presented cer-
tain cash awards in connection
with a program to stimulate con-
structive suggestions and to uti-
lize the experience, technical
knowledge and ingenuity of all
government employees and mili-
tary personnel. The ceremony
constituted the first presenta-
tion of such awards at this sta-
tion although it was learned that
several other awards are to be
made in the near future.

The maximum award that can
be presented locally, \$250, was
made to an employee who
brought about greatly increased
efficiency and a large saving
in both time and money. His
suggestion concerned the hand-
ling of certain tools and a change
in the working schedule of em-
ployees in his section.

A \$10 award was presented for
increased safety to pedestrians
in a warehouse installation and
another \$10 and a \$5 award were
made for improved working and
living conditions of employees.

The Civilian Cash Awards
Committee stresses the fact that
this is not a contest but is,
instead, a means of compensa-
tion for time and trouble taken
to make improvements outside
of an employee's line of duty.
